
# One Person Play in Two Acts: The Hollywood Legends

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#### **Act I: Marilyn Monroe**

Marilyn Monroe was born Norma Jeane Mortenson on June 1, 1926, in Los Angeles, California. Her mother, Gladys Pearl Baker, was a film cutter, and her father, Charles Stanley Gifford, was a traveling salesman. Monroe's parents divorced when she was three years old, and she was raised by her mother and a series of foster homes. 
#### **Act II: James Dean**


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
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
